

EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On Monday, May 21, 1866, trains will run as follows:

EBENSBURG.—Connecting with Day Exp. East and Balt. Exp. West. East and Day Exp. West. East and Day Exp. West.

TO THE SOLDIERS.—The soldiers of Cambria county who favor the election of Major Clymer as Governor assemble in session in Ebensburg to-day, (Wednesday), to elect delegates to a State Convention of soldiers which is to meet in Ebensburg on the 1st proximo.

On the 5th day of January, 1864, the amendment to the State Constitution providing the enfranchisement of the colored race came up before the Senate for consideration.

LAND SCRIP FOR SALE.—Surveyor General Campbell will receive proposals, until the 15th of August, for the purchase of Pennsylvania Agricultural Land Scrip, which will entitle the buyer to select a farm from any of the unappropriated lands (except mineral lands) of the United States, subject to private entry.

On the 2d day of August, 1864, went before the people of the State for their ratification or repudiation. In Cambria county, the measure was unopposed by the Democracy, and at the election, twenty-one hundred and forty-three Democrats voted against it.

DROWNED.—A young man named Amos Johnson, from Bedford, was drowned in Stull's mill-dam in Richland township, this county, on Monday week. He went into the water beyond his depth and was unable to swim.

MURDER OF GEORGE RAYMOND.—We learn that Mr. George Raymond was brutally murdered in his bed, at Woodbury, Gloucester county, New Jersey, on last Wednesday night, by an assassin, who entered his room and perpetrated the deed with an axe, crushing his head in a shocking manner, and then cutting his throat.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON THE RAILROAD.—Samuel Henderson, a resident of Conemaugh, Cambria county, and a brakeman on the local freight train of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was killed on Thursday last, at the Transfer Station, in the Ninth ward, Pittsburgh, under the following circumstances: An extra train was being made up, and deceased was engaged in coupling the cars.

OUR JOHNSTOWN LETTER. RAIN—MAN KILLED—MORE ABOUT THE PUDDLERS' STRIKE—BARR BALL, &c., &c. JOHNSTOWN, July 23, 1866.

Dear Alleg.: Rain! rain! rain! until we are wishing for a little even of the hot sunshines of a week ago.

On Saturday, a young man named Barney M'Bride, who had been living in Cambria Borough previous to the puddlers' strike, and since working east of Cresson, was coming home on the Altoona Accommodation, and was almost instantly killed by falling from the train a short distance west of Cresson.

We inadvertently stated last week that "not more than half the puddlers had gone to work." We should have said not more than one-fifth of the old puddlers were at work.

The strike continues, although the company had sixteen furnaces, single turn, in operation last week, manned in an indifferent manner by men, the majority of whom are more or less unfamiliar with the business.
