OUR JOHNSTOWN LETTER. THE POLITICAL BALL OPENED-UNION MASS MEETING -- FIRE -- BUSINESS MATTERS -- HEALTH,

JOHNSTOWN, Aug. 13, 1866. Dear Alleg. : The political ball was opened here on Friday evening last, on the part of the Republican party, by a mass meeting on the public square. The meeting was addressed by Senator Hall, of Blair county, Col. Jordon, Chairman of the State Central Committee, and Hon. Wm. Koontz, of Somerset.

On Saturday, one of the little frame buildings on the Foster House property, occupied by Mrs. Gillespie, a colored woman, took fire from an overheated stovepipe, which ran through the roof, and the whole roof was burned up ere the fire could be extinguished. Fortunately the day was calm and damp, otherwise no telling where the conflagration might have ended. To add to the discomfort of the unlucky occupant, a heavy, continuous rain commenced on Sunday morning and has not yet abated.

Business continues dull, and the town has not recovered from the effects of the prostration caused directly and indirectly by the late strike.
