OUR LORETTO LETTER.

Dear Alleghanian: The two educational institutions located in this place, the Seminary and the College, are enlarging their buildings, which, when completed, will be amongst the most extensive in the State.

The addition to the Seminary, under charge of the Sisters of Mercy, will consist of a new four story building 83 by 31 feet, and an additional story to the old building, making it also four stories in height.

The brick work has been contracted for by Mr. Geo. Diehl, of Hollidaysburg. The College will be enlarged by a wing to the main building 68 feet in length by 40 in width, and three stories in height.

The foundation is prepared and the brick work will be pushed forward immediately. The average attendance at the College is about 100. The annual session will open on the 1st of September.

To-day were consigned to the grave the mortal remains of Mary Daly, who died near Chess Springs on Saturday, of consumption. Deceased entered the convent of the Sisters of Mercy as a novice a few years ago, but the fatal disease had marked her for its own, and she returned to her home to linger out the few remaining days of her earthly existence.

Quite a number of the denizens of overcrowded cities have been spending the heated term in this boro. and vicinity. The Loretto Springs House, however, has not been very well filled this season.

Our borough authorities, stimulated by a sense of the requirements necessary to the better preservation of peace and good order here, have passed some very stringent ordinances of late, and one of these has become quite a source of revenue to the town.

I allude to an ordinance regulating the rate of speed of riding or driving through the streets. Almost daily, some ambitious young sojourner, actuated by a laudable desire to make 2.40 speed, finds himself "brought up," and his pocket lightened to the tune of \$2.00 fine.

PENSIONS!—\$15—\$20—\$25!

Under the act of Congress of June 6, 1866, Invalid Soldiers are entitled to Pensions as follows: 1. To those who have lost the sight of both eyes, or lost both hands, or are totally disabled in the same, the sum of \$25 per month.

2. To those who have lost both feet, or are totally disabled in the same, the sum of \$20 per month. 3. To those who have lost one hand or one foot, the sum of \$15 per month.

4. Pensions are granted to dependent fathers and brothers. New applications must be made in each of the above cases to get the increased Pensions.

Under the Pension Act of July, 1866, widows who are now receiving a Pension, are entitled to an increase of \$2.00 per month for each child they have under sixteen years of age.

Under the Act of July 29, 1866, soldiers who enlisted for three years and served their time out, or who were discharged on account of wounds received are entitled to \$100 ADDITIONAL BOUNTY, and soldiers who enlisted for two years and served their time out, or were discharged on account of wounds received, are entitled to \$50 BOUNTY.

Widows of deceased soldiers are entitled to bounty in addition to what they have received. I am prepared to collect all of the above claims promptly, and on reasonable terms. Send in your discharges and claims at once.
