THE JOHNSTOWN DISASTER.—The report of the Coroner's Jury summoned to investigate the causes of the late terrible accident at Johnstown, has been published. In their presentment, after relating the facts connected with the disaster, they present the following theory as the cause of the fall of the bridge or trestle: "That the essential timbers of the bridge or platform were partially decayed, the whole structure defective and insufficient to support and sustain the weight of persons drawn to and from it by its surface, and in addition necessarily dangerous; that the train stopped at an unusual point at the station and thereby drew the people to the most weak and dangerous part of the platform, and had said train stopped at the usual place of stopping at said station, the said accident would not probably have happened."

On Wednesday night of last week, Mrs. Walsh, one of the injured by the disaster, died. She makes the sixth addition to the home contributions to the relief fund, a considerable amount being handed in from abroad.
