Railroad near Gallitzin, on Monday. The smoke of the fire was plainly seen from this place. A company has been organized in Indiana, Indiana county, for the manufacture of Hollen Knitting Machines. The company have secured a lot of ground adjoining the railroad depot, and are preparing to erect suitable buildings for the prosecution of their work. The capital stock of the company is \$12,000—the greater part of which has been taken by a few individuals. A black snake measuring six feet in length was killed in the woods below the railroad depot on Friday.
