Who are Citizens of the U. S .---Their Natural Rights and Privileges Guaranteed.

SHALL LOYAU MEN, OR TRAITORS, CONTROL THE GOVERNMENT?

THE NATIONAL DEBT MUST BE PAID, AND THE REBEL DEST REPUDIATED.

The following are the proposed amendments to the National Constitution .-They were opposed by the Democratic party in Congress, and are opposed by Clymer and the Democracy now. They were passed by the Union Republicans in Congress, and are supported by the friends of Gen. Geary in the present campaign. These amendments constitute the platform of the Union Republican party:

" Resolved by the Senute and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, two-thirds of both Houses concurring. That the following article be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by three-fourths of the said Legislatures, shall be valid as a part of the Constitution, namely:

" ARTICLE ... , Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privilege, or immunities of citizens of the United States. Nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdistion the equal protection of the laws. "Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed; but whenever the right to vote at any election for electors of President and Vice President, or for United States Representatives in Congress, executive and judicial officers, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in that State. " Section 3. No person shall be a Senator

or Representative in Congress, elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the U. S., or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a memher of any State Legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebel-Hon against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof: but Congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

" Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States authorized by law, including debts incurred for the payment of pensions and bounties for service in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned, but neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against The United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave, but all such debts, obligations, and claims shall be held illegal and void.'
