Messrs. EVANS AND WATSON: (Gentlemen) The small size No. 1 Salamander card I purchased from your agent, Mr. Adam Bacr, in Lancaster City, on July 20th, 1867, has been subjected to a very severe which it withstood in a most admirable manner.
