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LOCAL CORRESPONDENCE. LETTER FROM WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP.—TERRIFIC ENCOUNTER WITH A WILD-CAT—GREAT EXCITEMENT, BUT NO LOSS OF LIFE OR LIMB—GRAND BALL—TARIFF.

HENLOCK, March 4, 1867. To the Editor of The Alleghenian: Our usually quiet village was thrown into convulsions of excitement a few days ago by the report gaining credence that a wildcat had been seen on "the border."

As the report was seemingly reliable, General Malanigan (who was a Finnegan General in the Home Guard) immediately issued a proclamation calling on the militia to rally in fifteen minutes time to march to repel—God willing—the invader.

The militia promptly responded to the call. Taking up their line of march, they were soon in the vicinity of the enemy, when the command halted and skirmishers were thrown out. The skirmishers fearlessly felt the enemy, and in due time reported at headquarters.

Detachment No. 1 reported that there was undoubtedly an enemy in front, but were of opinion it was a muskrat; detachment No. 2 thought the enemy was a Thomas cat; detachment No. 3 swore it was a skunk; detachment No. 4 offered to bet ten to one it was a goose.

The entire force were unanimous in declaring it was not a wildcat. Whereupon and without ceremony, the Guards, who had not come out for small game, were marched back to headquarters and disbanded by the General commanding.

A grand ball, whereat were the beauty and manhood of this neighborhood, was given at the Hemlock Hotel on Friday evening. Your correspondent was not present, but understands it was a great success.

Since the foregoing sensations spoken of, our town has resumed the quiet tenor of its way, with nothing to disturb its equanimity excepting the shrill whistle of a passing locomotive or of some forlorn shoemaker, and further excepting an occasional controversy on "the tariff" between prominent citizens of Lily Vale and a bachelor friend of Hemlock.

The weather has been wet of late, and our streets are very muddy. Owing to the neglect of the proper authorities, our pavements are in bad repair, but we yet hope to be able to wade through.
