LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

**EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD.**  
On and after Monday, April 29, 1867, trains on this road will run as follows:  
**LEAVE EBENSBURG—**  
At 6.05 A. M., connecting with Day Exp. East and Phil. Exp. West.  
At 7.00 P. M., connecting with Phila. Exp. East and Mail Train West.  
**LEAVE CRESSON—**  
At 9.24 A. M., on departure of Phil. Express West.  
At 8.40 P. M., on departure of Phila. Express East.

**ECCLESIOLOGICAL MATTERS.**—Ground was broken a few days ago for the erection of a new Catholic church in Ebensburg. The site of the new building is the northeast corner of Julian and Horner streets, immediately opposite the structure at present worshipped in by that congregation. It will be 100 feet in length, by 54 feet in width, with a tower 130 feet in height. The walls will be faced with pressed brick manufactured by the Johnstown Brick Manufacturing Co. It is the intention to erect not only an edifice which will meet the requirements of the steadily increasing congregation, but one which will prove an architectural honor to the town. The corner-stone will be laid, with appropriate ceremonies, some time during the present month.

During the latter part of last summer, the Disciples' congregation of this place commenced but did not finish a new church edifice, on High street, immediately west of the Union School House. It is of brick, 36 feet front by 55 feet deep, and Gothic as to style of architecture. Work has been recommenced on it, and when completed, it will be at once a neat and comfortable place of worship. Since the departure of Rev. Mr. Lloyd, the Disciples have been without a pastor. The completion of the building, we suppose, will be the signal for filling the vacancy.

**RAILROAD ACCIDENT AT WILMORE.**—A serious accident occurred on the Pennsylvania Railroad, near Wilmore, Cambria county, on Tuesday evening of last week. The Philadelphia Express east, comprising two baggage cars, three passenger cars, four sleeping cars, and the Directors' car of the Michigan Southern Railroad, and drawn by two engines, encountered a heavy land slide at the first curve east of Wilmore station. On one side of the track at this point is a high bank, and on the other the Conemaugh river. One of the engines left the track and went over into the river, while the other ran into a ditch; both were considerably damaged. The baggage cars and the first passenger car were totally wrecked, but the balance of the train escaped injury. The engineers and firemen were slightly hurt. Mr. Homan, of Harrisburg, express messenger, had a leg broken. Mr. Thomas M. Gregor, of Philadelphia, was bruised severely. Mr. R. J. Humphrey, of Ebensburg, was severely injured about the head; he was brought here on Wednesday, and is yet lying in a precarious condition. The passengers escaped without injury. It was six hours before the track was cleared of obstructions.

A supplement to the act approved April 18, 1866, to increase the fees of township clerks in the county of Wyoming, extending the same to Cambria county.  
An act relating to the sale of lands by the Commissioners of Cambria county.  
An act extending the provisions of an act relating to the licensing of billiard tables, bowling saloons, and nine or tennis alleys, at Cresson Springs, Cambria county, to Loretto Springs, in the same county.  
An act to incorporate the Johnstown and Hington's Run turnpike road company.  
An act to incorporate the Gallitzin and Cambria Mills turnpike road company.  
An act to authorize the removal of certain cases from the Court of Common Pleas of Cambria county to the Court of Common Pleas of Center county.

**MEMORANDA.**—The new Lutheran church of Johnstown will be dedicated to the service of Almighty God on Sunday, 19th inst. The Woodvale Woolen Factory, Johnstown, which partially suspended operations on the 1st of April, has resumed work in all its departments, with a full force of hands. The Sabbath School convention at Johnstown was well attended. It is estimated that in the procession on Thursday, there were not less than fifteen hundred children. Rev. David Harbison, at one time pastor of the Presbyterian church of this place, has accepted a call to preach at Salem Cross Roads, Westmoreland county. On Tuesday, a horse attached to a light wagon ran off through our streets. For the distance of a quarter of a mile, the animal kept the middle of the road, but at Mr. Fenlon's residence, he ran in on the pavement, and was stopped by the wagon coming in contact with a tree. The noise of the collision frightened a second horse near by, also attached to a light wagon, and he too ran off. No great damage was done in either case. Gold has been discovered in Millin county, in small quantities. The Grand Jury of Blair county have condemned the jail of Hollidaysburg as unsafe. The ice cream dispensed every night by Bob Thomas is delicious, but highly unseasonable. An unusually large number of shade trees have been planted along our streets this spring. "Acorn" next week. Wheat, 60 pounds; rye, 56; shelled corn, 56; cob corn, 70; corn meal, 40; coarse salt, 70; ground salt, 62; fine salt, 47; barley, 47; oats, 32; buckwheat, 50; clover seed, 54; timothy seed, 45; turnips, 55; onions, 46; peas, 56; malt, 38; unslacked lime, 80; anthracite coal, 80; bituminous coal, 76; coke, 40; potatoes, 56; sweet potatoes, 54; flax seed, 56; bran, 20; beans, 56; dried apples, 25; peaches, 38.
