

LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, April 29, 1867, trains on this road will run as follows: LEAVE EBENSBURG— At 6.05 A. M., connecting with Day Exp. East and Phil. Exp. West. At 7.15 P. M., connecting with Phila. Exp. East and Mail Train West.

MEMORANDA.—Two little girls fell into a boiler of hot water in Johnstown, on last Friday week, and were severely but not fatally scalded. J. W. Boddy, extensively known throughout Cambria county as a speculator in mineral lands, died suddenly at Newton Hamilton one day last week. The last Legislature raised the salary of the President Judge of this district to \$3,500 a year. The Associates receive \$5 a day for every day not exceeding fifty, and \$3 a day for every day in excess of fifty. Black band iron ore has been discovered in Somerset county. A man named James Handlin was arrested in that place on Friday week, and locked up in jail, charged with having committed the deed. William M'Cleery has been sent to the penitentiary for one year from Alleghany county for bigamy. Is he the William M'Cleery who was pardoned out of the penitentiary to testify in our Court against the murderers Busser and Houser? A Sabbath school scholar in Hollidaysburg was asked if he could read. He replied that he didn't know—he had never tried. The next State Fair will be held in Pittsburg on the 24th, 25th, 26th, 27th, 28th, and 29th days of September. A man named Hout, while felling trees in Westmoreland county recently, was struck by a descending sapling and had his neck broken. The locomotive ran into a buggy at the crossing in the east end of town, one day last week, and demolished it. The occupants of the buggy were not hurt. The "Mountain House" at Cresson has been opened for the summer season. The total amount of stock required to build the Johnstown Water Works, \$100,000, has been subscribed. We have been blessed with some "splendid growing weather" of late, and vegetation is looking up. The fine physique, good looks, and gentlemanly deportment of the Johnstown and Altoona base ball players, last week, conduced most notably to the popularity in our midst of "our National game." IMPORTANT TO FARMERS.—At the last session of the Legislature, Lewis Cobough, Christian Snyder, D. J. Morrell, and others, were authorized to form themselves into a company, with a capital of twenty thousand dollars or more, for the purpose of constructing a turnpike road from Johnstown along the line of Hingston's run to intersect the Clay turnpike at Belano, or the Indiana turnpike at a point to be determined. We heartily commend this enterprise to our farmers. At Johnstown is one of the best markets in the State for every imaginable product of farm garden, and this road will make access to it by wagon easy and pleasant. A farmer owning a tolerably good farm in Cambria county should never think of leaving it. Let him think only of improving it, and he will be more amply repaid in two or three years than any venture in the West could yield him in twice the time.

THE CROPS.—In the more southern States, a bountiful wheat crop has already been harvested, and Georgia wheat some days ago reached the New York market. In Tennessee, the harvest is in progress. From all directions come accounts of an excellent yield of grain, both in quantity and quality. It is thought that in some parts of this State, harvest may be begun before the first of July.
