

LOCAL AND PERSONAL.

EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, April 22, 1867, trains on this road will run as follows:

LEAVE EBENSBURG. At 6:05 A. M., connecting with Day Exp. East and Phil. Exp. West. At 7:15 P. M., connecting with Phila. Exp. East and Mail Train West.

LEAVE CRESSON. At 2:15 A. M., or on departure of Phil. Express West. At 1:45 P. M., or on departure of Phila. Express East.

MEMORANDA.—A young man named Higelow was drowned in the Conemaugh river, near Blairsville, on Saturday evening week. He was from Ashland county, Ohio. Elder Allen, from Illinois, has succeeded Elder Johnson as pastor of the Peoples Church, of Johnstown. Messrs. Wood, Morrell & Co. have taken possession of their new store building in Johnstown, and have filled it from cellar to garret with general merchandise. The building is the largest and most princely of all its appointments in western Pennsylvania.

A fellow named Joseph Shortliff who circulated extensively in this place a few weeks ago, was arrested in Johnstown the other day and committed to jail, charged with horse-stealing. He belongs to Indiana county. A widow woman named Tetter has been arrested in Johnstown on the charge of infanticide. The soldiers' monument in Altoona was dedicated, with much pomp and parade, on the 4th. The store of Mr. John Q. Adams, in Beltsano, this county, was entered on the night of the 3d inst., and robbed of a quantity of merchandise. The Freeman says that seven of the nine candidates on the Democratic county ticket are cripples. If so, then it is not to be expected that they will be able to run well. (Observation by our devil:—They may be able to run behind pretty well.) Apropos of this—many Republicans are opposed to our nominating a ticket this fall. They say they don't want to fight cripples. J. D. Hicks, of Tyrone, has been appointed Good Templar District Deputy for Cambria county. We have heard good judges of tobacco say that Mr. Rees Jno. Lloyd, at the P. This school, in addition to offering peculiar facilities to teachers and those designing to become teachers, will afford an excellent opportunity for superior instruction to others. THE GREAT QUESTION—HOGS AT LARGE, OR HOGS PENNED UP?—The following proclamation fully explains itself:

PROCLAMATION! Whereas, On the 21st day of June, 1867, an ordinance was duly passed by the Burgess and Town Council of the borough of Ebensburg, preventing the running at large of hogs within the limits of said borough; And whereas, At the request of certain citizens, complaining of the injustice of said ordinance, the said borough authorities declined to enforce the provisions thereof, until the sense of the voters of the borough might be taken in relation thereto; And whereas, On the 2d day of July, 1867, the said Council did by resolution authorize and empower the said Burgess to order an election of the voters of said borough, to decide whether or not a majority thereof are in favor of sustaining the provisions of the aforesaid ordinance; Now therefore, I, T. Blair Moore, Burgess, as aforesaid, do, in pursuance and by virtue of said resolution, hereby proclaim and make known that an election of and by the qualified voters of the said borough of Ebensburg, will be held at the Court House in said borough, on Saturday, the 20th day of July, 1867, between the hours of two and seven o'clock, p. m., to determine [by ballot printed on the inside of the Ordinance, and on the inside, respectively, "For the Ordinance," and "Against the Ordinance,"] whether or not a majority of such qualified voters are in favor of the provisions of the ordinance aforesaid.
