EBENSBURG AND CRESSON RAILROAD. On and after Monday, Ap. 29, 1867, trains on this road will run as follows:

LEAVE EBENSBURG—At 6.05 A. M., connecting with Day Exp. East and Phil. Exp. West.

At 7.15 P. M., connecting with Phila. Exp. East and Mail Train West.

LEAVE CRESSON—At 2.21 A. M., or on departure of Phil. Express West.

At 8.40 P. M., or on departure of Phila. Express East.

COURT PROCEEDINGS.—The following cases were disposed of by the Court of Common Pleas of Cambria county last week:

Emma Pringle, admx. of John Pringle, dec'd., vs. George W. Pringle—feigned issue. Jury find for plaintiff.

Wm. W. Jackson, Jeremiah Ritz and Rachel his wife, late Rachel Jackson, Thomas Burchinell and Lavinia his wife, late Lavinia Jackson, Mary B. Fredericks, intermarried with Wm. Fredericks,

late Mary B. Jackson, and Laura Mattern, by her guardian David Watson, heirs of Thomas Jackson, dec'd., vs. Chas. Johnson and James Johnson—ejunction. Jury find for plaintiffs the land described in writ, that portion of it embraced or described in agreement signed W. W. Jackson, agent of Thomas Jackson, dated 17th August, 1855, to be released on payment of \$230, with interest.

Michael Higgins vs. Mordecai Delange and Henry Dean, trading under the firm of Delange & Dean—assumpsit. Jury find for plaintiff \$776.73.

The balance of the trial list was continued. Court adjourned on Saturday.

The following sentences were passed by the Court: Marshall Lindsay, convicted of an attempt to commit rape, to pay a fine of \$5 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for three years.

John Brimmer, convicted of involuntary manslaughter, to pay a fine of \$5 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for one year.

James F. Howard, convicted of larceny, to pay a fine of \$5 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for two years.

Lewis Shermer, convicted of larceny, to pay a fine of \$2 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for one year.

Isaac Ludy, convicted of larceny, to pay a fine of \$1 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for one week.

Joseph Barnes, convicted of larceny, to pay a fine of \$1 and costs and undergo imprisonment in the county jail for six months.

Lindsay, Howard and Shermer were removed to the penitentiary by Sheriff Myers on Monday.

BASE BALL.—The match game between the celebrated "Irons" of Johnstown and the "Mountaineers" of this place came off, as per arrangement, on the grounds of the latter club on Thursday last. It was one of the best contested and most exciting games of the season.

On the third and fourth innings, the score was a tie, but on the fifth, the "Irons" took the lead and kept it till nearly the close of the game. At the end of the eighth inning, the score stood 26 to 21, in favor of the "Irons." The "Irons" then went to the bat, and added 5 more to their score. The "Mountaineers," with 10 to tie and 11 to beat, took the bat, and by dint of the most terrific striking, added no less than 14 to their score, winning the game by 4 runs. During this part of the last inning, ball after ball went clear over the out-fielders' heads, and 10 runs were made before a man was put out. We append the score:

LETTER FROM JOHNSTOWN.—BASE BALL MATCHES ON THE TAPIS—SCORES OF THE GAMES PLAYED BY THE "IRONS" ON THEIR LATE TOUR—ACCIDENTS, &c.

JOHNSTOWN, Sept. 16, 1867.

Two first-class games of ball will be played here during the present week.—The first will be between the "Juniatas" of Hollidaysburg and the "Kicks," on Friday; the other, between the "Juniatas" and the "Irons," on Saturday.

I subjoin the scores of the several games played by the "Irons" of this place during their late base ball tour.

On Monday, they played the "Socials" of Huntingdon in that place, winning by the following score:

LETTER FROM HEMLOCK.—MAGNITUDE OF THE BERRY TRADE THIS SEASON—OVER TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS' WORTH SHIPPED OFF—THE PIC-NIC, &c.

HEMLOCK, Sept. 16, 1867.

The berry season closed on Saturday. Your readers will no doubt be astonished to learn the quantity of berries shipped from this station (Lily's) since the middle of July.

A close estimate shows that there were shipped, of huckleberries, 18,560 quarts, at an average of 20 cents per quart, making \$3,712.00; of raspberries, 18,560 quarts, at an average of 15 cents per quart, making \$2,784.00; of blackberries, 55,680 quarts, at an average of 6 1/2 cents per quart, making \$3,619.20.

The berries have been indeed an acceptable source of revenue to our citizens.—For a couple of months back, our coal and other works have been stopped, and all hands, large and small, have engaged in picking them. When it is taken into consideration that on two days of each week no berries could be shipped, and that the home consumption is not included in the estimate, the above figures may look unreasonable, but they are nevertheless a close approximation to the truth.

The Adams Express Co. acted wisely this season in sending an agent here to take charge of the shipping. Mr. R. W. Barnhisel was the agent, and gave entire satisfaction to all parties concerned. Mr. R. Detling's pic-nic came off yesterday, and was a grand success.
