"The prison to which we now ask the attention of our readers is the county jail of Ebensburg, Cambria county. In order that on idea may be formed of the necessity of a year 1864 the Legislature created Cambria county, its length being 35 miles and breadth 19 miles, thus giving an area of 665 square miles. It occupies one of the most elevated ositions on the western side of the Alleghay Mountains. The people possess considbing getting out lumber and agriculture.

The jail at Ebensburg was erected in 1840, of brick, the building being 40 feet square. Like the most of the county prisons, the sheriff's family occupy part of the building. Two rooms on the first floor are assigned to the prisoners, each of them being about 15 feet square. The windows are conseniently arranged for the prisoners, as they open upon the street, and the occupants can not only communicate with persons on the outside, but receive any package that can be bassed through the bars, which are four inthes apart. The walls are lined with oak plank, and the inside partitions are of the same material, thus affording great danger y fire. The second story contains a room 8 feet by 15 feet, having one small window o admit light and air, and in it are six cells. he sheriff informed Inspector Dickinson hat this den, with the two rooms below, will old, without crowding, sixteen prisoners .the only light and ventilation that this black ole has is through the little window on the stairs, it having been placed there to light the stairs only. It is very low down, being zessiy on a level with the floor, and affords but little of either light or ventilation. No water closets are in the cells, but ag ordinary vessel is used, and the tax on the endurance of the prisoners is shocking in the extreme, the atmosphere being of the most sickening and stifling character. In order to add exquisite brutality to the place, the doors of the cells are very low, not more than five eet; thus the space in the cell, from the top of the door to the ceiling, say five feet more, holds all the impure air, and the prisoner,

"The present sheriff considers the jail unsafe at insecure as far as detaining prisoners is concerned, and states that before he occupled the position many prisoners escaped, and in order to prevent this he either guards or chains them. Inspector Dickinson conwith the prisoners, who all expressed admire to be sent to the penitentiary, conching, however bad it might be, there was possibility of its exceeding in inhumanity

OThere is a yard or enclosure adjoining he jail, but the wall is so low and rough hat prisoners could climb it as easily almost s they could a ladder; consequently they e not permitted to be in the yard for fear escape. Two men recently executed for aurder were, in consequence of the small ze and unsafe condition of the jail-yard, ing in an open lot in the rear of the prison. sembly, which requires that executions al! take place within the jail enclosure, and e sheriff, who replied that he had a board nce put around the scaffold, or gallows, and pointed out the place of execution. The spector found the gallows was erected on a gh elevation, and, notwithstanding there say have been a fence around it, all the intabitants of the county could readily have witnessed the execution, thus clearly violaing the letter and spirit of the law.

"In conclusion, we will use the language of Inspector Dickinson, who expresses the opinion of a good citizen and humane man. He says this jail is unfit to continue any one in. It is insecure, as is shown by the fact of a large number of prisoners escaping before the present jailor took position. Should be relax his watchfulness, all of the prisoners might leave in one night, and thus would be let loose to riot, plunder, or murder, as they might feel inclined. The citizens of other counties have a right to demand that Cambria ounty, with its great wealth, provide a place or the safe-keeping of offenders, and bumanly asks and pleads with the people of this unty for the proper care of the prisoners. bough they are offenders against the law hey should be treated as human beings."
