

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

the exclusion of our usual variety of reading matter, we to-day print President Johnson's annual message in full. The Constitution provides that the Magistrate of the nation shall from time to time transmit to Congress information on the state of the Union. Mr. Johnson seizes the opportunity as a fit occasion to ignore facts, misstate history, and to ignore the Legislative department of the Government.

IMPEACHMENT.

On Friday last, the National House of Representatives took a vote on the question of impeaching the President, which resulted in the overwhelming defeat of the measure. Sixty-seven Republicans voted against the resolution. It is worthy of note that Gen. B. F. Butler did not vote at all. Our own Representative, Hon. D. J. Morrell, did not vote. We suspend the resolution under which the vote was taken, and the vote itself: That Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, be impeached for high crimes and misdemeanors. Yeas 57; nays 111.

RECOVERING.—A young boy named McCallin, residing in Alleghany township, was accidentally stabbed with a butcher-knife by a companion on Saturday last. He is recovering. A German named Conrad Walters was assaulted and nearly killed by two boys, named Gore and Barber, in Johnstown, on the 29th ult. The boys were arrested and are now in jail. COURT PROCEEDINGS.—We subjoin a summary of the business transacted by the Court last week:

In the Quarter Sessions— Comth. vs. Christian Stropp—assault and battery. Defendant pleads guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$1.00 and costs. Comth. vs. James E. Lavery—seduction, fornication and bastardy. Guilty. Motion for new trial. Comth. vs. Hiram Hayes—adultery. Not guilty. Comth. vs. Edward M'Manamy—assault and battery. Defendant pleads guilty and submits. Comth. vs. Michael Blennel—larceny. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs, and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for 15 months. Comth. vs. Same—larceny. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs, and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for one year. Comth. vs. Daniel Walters and Joseph Walters—assault and battery. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs. Comth. vs. Monroe Scott—larceny, and entering the Mountain House (Ebensburg) saloon with intent to steal. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs, and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for 18 months. Comth. vs. Valentine Malzi—involuntary manslaughter, in killing young Martin in Wilmore two weeks ago. Bill ignored by the Grand Jury. Comth. vs. George Welch—larceny. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5.00 and costs, and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for two years. Comth. vs. Michael Barret—assault. Guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and costs. Comth. vs. Benjamin Rodgers and Joseph Wherry—arson. Bill ignored by the Grand Jury. In the Common Pleas— Comth. vs. George Gates, George Engelbach, and Henry Foster—scire facias. Sur recognizance. Piff. takes a non-suit. Nicholas Altinus vs. James R. Cooper debt. Verdict badly mixed. Court adjourned Friday. The attendance this (second) week is not large. The civil list has all been continued excepting one case, that of Gillis against the Penna. R. R. Co.—an action for damages based on injuries received by the plaintiff by the falling of the depot platform at Johnstown in September, 1866. This is looked upon as a case by which the validity of a multitude of other cases of a precisely similar character will be tested, and excites much interest.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.—The first annual institute for Cambria county, under the new law will be held in the Court House, Ebensburg, commencing Tuesday, January 7th, 1868, and continue four days. The exercises will embrace the election of a committee on permanent certificates, the examination of candidates for permanent certificates, lectures on educational topics, class drills in the various branches of school study, spelling contests, reports and discussions thereon, &c. A general attendance of teachers is requested.

THAT CONCERT.—We are glad to be able to state that the long-deferred concert in aid of the Mountaineer Base Ball Club will positively come off about New Year's. That accomplished musician, Prof. Hugh Hughes, has kindly consented to assume the leadership of the choir. He will be assisted by the very best musical talent of this section, both vocal and instrumental. A rare treat may be expected.

OH!—The Freeman last week seemed to be out of humor, as it certainly was out of sense. Because we had answered fairly and to the point whatever argument or proof it offered to show the Republican party "Puritanical," it calls us a "quibbler." Well, neighbor, in this controversy, which you sought with us, we had to answer either your quibbles or nothing. You gave us no alternative.

ELECTION.—A. C. Mullin, Esq., having resigned the position of Secretary of the Cambria County Protection Mutual Fire Insurance Company,—one of the best companies of its kind in the State, by the way,—an election was held on Saturday last and Reese J. Lloyd, Esq., was chosen to fill the vacancy.

DEAD.—Billings G. Childs, Esq., a member of the Pittsburg Bar, died lately, in New York State. He was concerned as counsel for the defense in the celebrated Moore-Marbourg homicide case, tried before the Cambria county Court two years ago.

MARRIED.—At St. Augustine, on the 30th ult., by Rev. Burnes, Mr. Theodore Shoemaker, of Ebensburg, to Miss Kate Ivory, of the former place. Thrice happy may they be.
