ETCHINGS.—The office of the Treasurer of Huntingdon county was entered by burglars on the night of the 23d instant, who blew open the safe, but failed to obtain more than a dollar or two for their trouble. The Treasurer luckily had the bulk of his funds deposited in bank... Charles Barclay, aged sixty years, a watchman on the Penna. Railroad near Blair Furnace, Blair county, gave food and shelter to an Englishman named Sims on the night of the 11th. Sims had represented himself as being in a destitute condition. Before going to bed, the old man knelt as usual to pray, when Sims jumped on his back, garroted him, and robbed him of a silver watch. The ungrateful wretch then decamped, but was subsequently arrested and committed to jail... The Congregationalist congregation of this place have purchased a lot of ground on High street, near the site occupied by the Presbyterian church, and intend erecting thereon in the spring a large and elegant brick church edifice. The stones for the foundation are now being got out... One day not long ago, a man in Blair county came suddenly on a drove of wild turkeys. The ground was covered with ice, and so the turkeys could neither fly nor run fast. The man captured two fine gobblers, one of which subsequently escaped... Three men, named Thomas Gordon, Frank Little, and S. Bradley, were tried at the late session of the Clearfield county Court for inhumanly mutilating a horse, were found guilty, and sentenced as follows—Gordon, to pay a fine of \$500 and go to the penitentiary for two years and nine months; Little, to pay a fine of \$500 and go to the penitentiary one year and nine months; Bradley, to pay a fine of \$500 and go to the penitentiary one year and nine months. One of these defendants, probably two, was possibly all three, formerly lived in Cambria county... That popular landlord, Mr. R. Detling, of the "Miners Home" at Heacock, will give a grand ball to his friends on the 24th February. All lovers of a "good time" should attend... Mr. Wm. Bell, of Jefferson county, was instantly killed last week by a large limb falling upon him from a tree which he was cutting down... Rev. David Harbison, pastor of the Presbyterian church at New Salem, Westmoreland county, (formerly of Ebensburg,) commenced a revival during the first week of January, which continued two weeks, and during that time some forty new members were won to the church... A coal bank caved in on a miner named Jacob Winters at Penn station, the other day, and crushed him to death... Mr. James F. Campbell, formerly of Johnstown, has commenced the publication of a newspaper in Wellsburg, West Va... Mr. George Settlemyer, of Wilmore, has a cow that has had four calves within a twelvemonth... A young man named James Martin was crushed to death in a coal bank near Centerville, Indiana county, on the 15th instant, by a mass of coal weighing three tons falling upon him... We direct attention to the card of Mr. Peter McDermott, manufacturer of and dealer in sarsaparilla, mineral water, bottled ale, and porter, Johnstown. Persons wishing to buy anything in that line cannot buy a better article or cheaper than from Peter... The snow is over one foot in depth, and the sleighing excellent. The farmers and business men are making good use of the good roads, and the quantities of produce and lumber brought to town daily are astonishing... The Auditors have nearly completed the task of auditing the accounts of the county for the past year... The price of flour in Pittsburg, according to T. C. Jenkins' latest circular, ranges from \$10.25 to \$12.50 per barrel... The Freeman had a communication last week from Wilmore, on National politics, the writer of which it classified as a "patron of The Alleghenian." The Freeman appears to know more about our business than we know ourselves... The eleventh annual statement of the Cambria County Insurance Company, published elsewhere, shows that institution to be in good financial condition. It could not well be otherwise, with the able corps of managers at its head... The "annual Rager ball," we are told, will come off in Jackson township this evening... A variety of excellent reading will be found on the first page of this paper.

THE TRIENNIAL ASSESSMENT.—The result of the triennial assessment of the real estate of Cambria county for 1866 has been published. The figures place the valuation of the whole county at \$2,262,936; but it must be remembered that the real value is five times the appraised valuation—or over \$11,000,000. Millville borough is appraised at \$356,580, and is the richest district in the county. Summitville borough is appraised at \$5,909, and is the poorest district in the county. Johnstown and suburbs are valued at \$840,000, while Ebensburg is valued at \$84,000. The Johnstown Tribune lays great stress on the disproportion between these figures, and exultingly exclaims, "Johnstown is worth ten times Ebensburg." True; but it should be remembered that the value of Ebensburg has been brought to its present dimensions by the sturdy, plodding industry of its inhabitants, while Johnstown owes its wealth mainly to the accidental introduction of the Cambria Iron Works, based on outside capital, into its midst.
