

Letter from General Sheridan.

At the Cooper Institute meeting Tuesday evening, Mr. R. F. Andrews read a letter from General Sheridan, written to the meeting of the 22d ult., and not received until Monday last. General Sheridan says:

"I feel a deep interest in the success of our honored chieftain in the ensuing Presidential election, believing that in it are involved the peace and prosperity of the country. I believe the same contest is now before the nation that existed during the rebellion, and that a political victory now is as necessary as was a military victory then; and although I feel the deepest reluctance to say aught that will connect me with any political canvass, still, the memory of hard fought fields, an interest for the sacred cause for which so many lives were lost, compels me now, when that cause is in danger, to unequivocally give it my support. I have not thought the rebellion ended, and now when I see it again outcropping, under its old leaders, I see the verification of the frequent boast made while I was in New Orleans, that the cause of Secession was not lost, but would yet be accomplished by making the Northern people fight each other; that the Ohio River would be the boundary line of the Southern Confederacy, and that the rebel flag would on that line bid defiance to the Stars and Stripes."

This patriotic letter was received with thunders of applause, a happy prelude to the good news that so soon succeeded it.

SUNSHINE AND SHADOW IN NEW YORK.

It is not always that we can command our readers to purchase books of real value even, for these may be so prosy, though full of important facts, as to be forever unread on their shelves. But in the book whose title we quote above, the judicious and enterprising publishing house of J. B. Whoever opens the book to read will not permanently lay it aside till he has gone over every line of its ninety-two chapters, and he cannot but feel that he is more than paid for the cost of the book several times over, in the valuable facts, spicy incidents, etc., with which the book is filled. He will, in short, know New York far better than the majority of her native citizens; and to know New York in all her aspects; her high life and low life; her good and evil; her vast fortunes and her countless misfortunes; how her great financial leaders have won their honest successes, and how brilliantly vice shines, or sadly it wallows in its infamy, beside them, is to know about all there is to be known of the active life of the whole country; for New York is not only the commercial center of America, but a focus of all the good and bad in the land.

INSANITY characterizes the efforts of the rebel Democracy to bring General Grant out. His persistent quietude, which is second only to his modesty, is a terrible contrast for them with the volatility of their Blair and the incoherent and unguarded expressions of their Seymour. "Oh that mine enemy would write a book!" was the prayer of one of our friends in the midst of tribulation. "Oh that General Grant would say something!" is the every day imprecation of the Democracy. Their straits must be desperate indeed when they acknowledge the otherwise perfect character of the Republican leader by inviting him to show his head above the rifle-pits in order that they may get a shot at him. What a comic portrait it would make to picture the Democratic party cursing Grant for not saying something and in the same breath cursing Blair for saying too much!

The effect produced by the recent elections upon the United States securities is marvellous. The demand for five-twentieths on the 14th was so great as to occupy the greater portion of the time of those parties dealing largely in United States securities. Even railway shares began to look up, and speculation in all manner of stocks derived a fresh impetus in proportion as the election of Grant was assured by the receipt of the election returns. Wall street imagined it had prepared for the demands to be made upon it throughout the day, but it was taken completely by surprise and compelled to confess its inability to perform the labor demanded of it. At this rate, where will the ruin occasioned by the Republican victories end?
