Total expenditures of the system for tuition, building, renting, purchasing, and repairing houses, fuel, and contingencies, \$6,118,675 19. Total expenditures of the system for all purposes, \$6,200,537 96. FIRE IN ALTOONA.-The freight car repair shops of the Pennsylvania R. R. Auditor General of the Commonwealth Company in Altoona, together with fifteen cars which were undergoing repairs, were entirely destroyed by fire on Thursday night of last week. The shops consisted of two frame buildings, with a capacity for about thirty cars. Owing to the combustible character of the buildings and of the material in them, the flames spread very rapidly, and all efforts were unavailing to save either the buildings or their contents. The loss is estimated at about \$25,000.

On the Thursday night preceding this conflagration, a building belonging to Mr. T. W. Marriott was discovered to be on fire, but the flames were speedily extinguished. On the Saturday following, the lumber yard of the P. R. R. Co. was discovered to be on fire, but it was put out before any damage had been done. The frequent recurrence of fires in Altoona forces the conviction that that city is cursed by an organized band of incendiaries, intent on destruction and pillage.

DIED-In Latrobe, on Thursday night last, Rev. N. H. Gillett, pastor of the Latrobe and Pleasant Unity (Westmoreland county) Presbyterian churches, aged about 70 years. The deceased had been a minister of the Gospel for fifteen or twenty years, and was loved and respected by all who knew him.
