LETTER FROM JOHNSTOWN—MORE ABOUT THE REMOVAL OF THE COUNTY SEAT—THE QUESTION STATISTICALLY, POLITICALLY, SPECULATIVELY, AND AT LENGTH CONSIDERED—WHAT THEY WANT, HOW THEY WANT IT DONE, AND WHAT THEY WANT TO DO WITH IT—A CHERFUL VIEW ON THE ONE HAND, AND A DOLEFUL VIEW ON THE OTHER—“THERE'S NOT A SMILE BUT HAS ITS SIGN,” &c.

JOHNSTOWN, Feb. 15, 1869.

To the Editors of The Alleghanian:

Since my former letter, a bill has been read in the lower House, by Representative Porter, for the removal of the county seat of Cambria county to Johnstown.

By taking the vote on the State ticket in 1868, in the following named election districts, to-wit: Cambria boro., Conemaugh tp., Conemaugh boro., Croyle tp., East Conemaugh boro., Franklin boro., Johnstown boro., Jackson tp., Millville boro., Prospect boro., Richland tp., Summerhill tp., Taylor tp., Wilmore boro., and Yoder tp., you will find the vote about 3,600, which is more than one-half the vote polled in the county.

I am also informed that a company is about being formed here to manufacture pig metal, iron, nails, and steel from the raw material. Large bodies of valuable iron ore, coal, limestone, &c., have been discovered in this immediate neighborhood.

Our annual spring election is drawing near, and as it approaches, we are admonished that a very lively time may be anticipated. A number of good names have suggested themselves, from which a ticket can be selected that will shed honor upon our borough.

The partial dismemberment of the county is not now disguised by the leaders in the matter. All the territory north of the township will be detached to form, with parts of Indiana and Clearfield counties, a new county, and in lieu of this loss, two townships from Somerset, and one each from Westmoreland and Indiana, will be added to Cambria, which will give ample territory for the new county, and a convenient seat of justice for the townships not now enjoyed by them.

Another objection, and the most serious in the minds of some, is, that the political status of the new or changed county may also be changed, and the Republican party obtain control of the pot of pottage.

There are some here who are not sanguine of success in the movement, and are in favor of consolidating the several boroughs into one grand city corporation, possessing all the powers, pomp, and unnumbered number of officials, as well as the reputation of our modern cities.

I am satisfied, however, that no effort will be spared, nor a stone left unturned, that will in the least degree contribute to accomplish the removal of the county seat to Johnstown.
