TOWN COUNCIL.—The newly elected Town Council met Friday evening for organization. Present—Burgess Abel Lloyd; Councilmen Samuel Henry, John Thompson, F. H. Barker, East Ward; C. T. Roberts, John E. REMOVAL OF THE COUNTY SEAT.—The question of the removal of the seat of justice of Cambria county from Ebensburg to Johnstown was taken into consideration by the House committee on New Counties and County Seats, at Harrisburg, on Thursday last. After able arguments, pro and con, by representatives of either town, the committee (consisting of fifteen members) reported unanimously against the proposed removal. That settles the question, for the present at least.

LOCAL CORRESPONDENCE. LETTER FROM JOHNSTOWN.—REMOVAL OF THE COUNTY SEAT—CLOSING THE BOOKS. JOHNSTOWN, March 1, 1869. To the Editors of The Alleghanian: The astounding fact was revealed to us last Friday that the Committee of the Legislature to whom was referred the bill for the removal of the county-seat to this place had reported adversely. This item of unexpected news created quite a furor among our citizens, and some who are devoid of charity attribute the result to the incompetency of our local committee who had charge of the case and represented us at Harrisburg. Be that as it may, we acknowledge our defeat, though reluctantly, and now look around and endeavor to study the cause or causes of the action of the Committee on County Seats, and if possible avert a similar catastrophe at a future time. The fate of our project disclosed hidden rocks in the sea of legislation not marked on our chart.
