CHICKEN CHOLERA.—In 1854 I lost 87 fowls from a flock of over 200, from the above disease. Being ignorant as to the cause, as well as to what I should do to check the disease, I gave them everything I could think of, and finally blundered on to what would seem to be the very thing to increase the trouble, that is sulphur and red pepper, equal parts, mixed with sweet milk. The result, a constipation nearly as fatal as the disease. Here, however, was a discovery that led to other and more successful experiments.

The symptoms are lassitude and emaciation in very severe cases, the voiding of white matter, streaked with yellow. This appears like the yolk of an egg when stale and clings to the feathers near the vent.

My treatment is white chalk. 2 parts, rice flour, 3 parts, flour of sulphur, one part, moistened with alum to paste. Give this twice a day till relieved. For drink give 1 teaspoonful of tincture of iron to 3 parts of water. For bloody flux, boiled rice and milk, given warm, with a little chalk.

My preventives of all diseases are sulphur, tincture of iron and zinc. I fumigate my henry with flour of sulphur four times a year, when the fowls are out, of course. Mix sulphur with ashes, in the bottom of every nest, both of laying and setting hens. I add one pound of sulphur to equal parts of scalded bran and corn meal for thirty hens while the incubating process is going on. I have raised over 600 chickens this season, and have not lost a chicken by disease. I gave sulphur in their feed once a week, and I will give one dollar bounty for every house that can be found on my chickens.—*Pravie Farmer.*

FARM IMPLEMENTS.—Every farmer should have a good dry house, in which to store farm implements, which are out of place in the barn or woodhouse. We have seen many very convenient wagon and implement rooms under the same roof. At any rate every farmer should have a room for implements somewhere, and now that harvest and corn-tending are over, all reapers, cradles, scythes, sickles, plows, harrows, rollers, hoes, shovels, forks, etc., should be put away in good order. Take off all dirt and scour away rust. Then grease liberally. Much will also be gained by painting the wood work of farming implements. This can be done at a small cost, and by the farmer himself. Every farmer should learn how to paint his own tools and implements. He should take a day in September and do his own painting. He can do it. There is no danger of failure. He can at least put on the paint so it will preserve the wood, and this should be the chief object in view. But if the farmer should neglect to paint his farm implements, he must not, at least, neglect to place them all in a dry room, as we have recommended. Leaving plows, harrows, rollers, hoes, etc., in fence corners and scattered around loose in the yard, exposed to weather through the winter, is alike unprofitable and disagreeable.

TO LAY A FENCE WORM.—To lay a fence worm with five feet crook.—Drive two stakes into the ground, about ten feet apart, on the line intended for the fence row. Measure off two and a half feet on another stake and mark with a notch. Keep this stake in the hand; then, walking backwards, place it upright in a line with the other two. Lay it down, square off to the right hand, and the notch marks the place for the first corner. Having placed two rails to form this corner, again walk backwards, sight as before and lay down on the left side, and move the near end of the rail to the notch, which indicates always the corner or lap. Thus, the corners, formed alternately on different sides of the line, and always two and a half feet from it, are all straight. The fence has a uniform crook and makes the most mechanical fence possible, in the usual zigzag style.

This rule is easy and will give your fence a neat, straight and uniform appearance. It may be of benefit to new beginners.

SAVE THE PIECES.—"Any farmer who does not practice saving the pieces would be surprised at the real profit derived by laying up the odds and ends about his premises. Every day almost there are bits thrown away, at the time considered of no value which perhaps not many days subsequent would save time and money. How many times a year does a farmer want a strip of board, a piece of wedge or pine timber, something for a hammer handle or a rake tooth, which cannot be obtained without spoiling valuable material; or going to some carpenter shop, and perhaps while this delay is made, a team and hired man are standing still, waiting for a broken tool to be put in order."
