

The Farmers' Department.

THE WHEAT CROP.—The report of the Department of Agriculture for January contains an unusual amount of interesting information. It appears from the reports collected and classified that the average yield of New England wheat per acre was less last year than in 1867. The average yield of New York is placed at 14.6 instead of 14.5 last year. New Jersey gives one-tenth of a bushel less, and Pennsylvania three tenths more, and the more Southern Atlantic States all make a decline in the average. Texas and Tennessee report a smaller yield than last year, while Arkansas claims an advance from 9.2 to 13.5 bushels. Kentucky and West Virginia make no material advance, and Ohio scarcely holds the previous average. A small increase appears in Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin, and a still more marked result in Minnesota. An increase is made in Iowa and Kansas.

The decline in the price of wheat during the past twelve months has been very perceptible, amounting to 45 cents per bushel in New England, 56 cents in New York, 47 cents in New Jersey, 45 cents in Pennsylvania, 71 cents in Ohio, 77 cents in Illinois, 48 cents in Iowa, with differences less striking in the Southern States, which grow cereals only for home consumption. In the central and populous parts of the West the prices this year are lower relatively to the Western and Northwestern States than last year; Illinois compared with Iowa, \$1.07 to \$1.43 last January; \$1.20 to 95 cents now.

LARGEST STEER IN THE WORLD.—There is a white steer, aged six years and six months, belonging to Samuel H. Jones, of Sangamon county, Illinois, that is six feet six inches high; nine feet six inches in length; ten feet six inches around the girth; three feet across the hips; and weighs three thousand and six hundred pounds! He is a cross of the "Short Horn Durham" and the "Patton" stock.

An excursion party was made up recently, at Springfield, with the express purpose of visiting this monster beast, twelve miles from that place, at Williamsburg. The party, on their arrival, appointed a committee, consisting of Col. White, of Sangamon county, and our fellow citizen, A. W. Bothwell, Esq., to take the exact measurement of this steer, which they did, with the above result. We derive these facts from Mr. A. W. Bothwell, one of the committee-men, and therefore they may be relied upon as correct. Mr. Jones has been offered \$1,500 for his steer, but refused to sell. He purposes increasing its weight to 4,000 pounds, when he is to receive two thousand dollars for it. We challenge the whole world to produce a steer equal in size and weight to the one described.—American Stock Journal.

THE BUTTER-MAKER'S CHURNING.—According to Mr. X. A. Willard's views the great secret in butter-making consists in attending to the following points:

- 1. Securing rich, clean, healthy milk, milk obtained on rich old pasture, free of weeds.
2. Setting the milk in a moist, untailed atmosphere, and keeping it at an even temperature while the cream is rising.
3. Proper management in churning.
4. Washing out the butter milk thoroughly, and working so as not to injure the grain.
5. Thorough and even incorporation of the salt, and packing in oaken tubs, tight, clean and well made.
6. Cleanliness in all the operations, is of imperative necessity.
7. Judgment and experience in manipulating the cream and working the butter must of course be used.

"GOOSE WHEAT."—Some years since, a goose was shot in Washington Territory, and a few grains of wheat were taken from his claw. Being very large and full, they were preserved and planted. The yield was found to be so great as to lead to its propagation, until this variety, which is known in the Territory as the "Goose Wheat," has become a standard one in that section of the country. Samples of this wheat were recently sent to the Agricultural Department at Washington. Upon examining the samples at the museum, of which there are some two thousand varieties, the same wheat was found, being one of the samples sent from the Paris Exposition, and grown in Cuenca, in Spain.

FLAX seed occasionally given to horses, or cattle, will make them shed their old hair, and whether old or young soon get sleek and fat. It is the only thing which will fatten old horses.

A fruit grower in a Western State tried the experiment of burning brimstone on a hot shovel under a plum tree, to kill the curculio. The burning was done weekly and the fruit saved.
