

The Farmers' Department.

A WORD TO FARMERS.—It is not often that we pretend to give advice to the farming community, because we believe they know their own business best. But we are told that a great many farmers have become excited by the high price paid for hogs this year, and are eagerly buying up stock hogs at 8 and 10 cents per pound, for next year's feedings. Farmers have been taught by better experience before this, that because certain farm products are high one year, it does not signify that it is to be so next year, and in nine cases out of ten the very reverse is really true. Hogs may be high next year, but if the crop is enormously increased, it is only fair to presume they will not be.

The best plan is to keep straight on and feed only your usual number of hogs for the next year. Don't buy down or use up all your own corn crop in feeding hogs. When a farmer turns all his attention to raising one product to the detriment of others, he injures himself. Their experience in sheep taught many farmers this lesson. Wool and sheep were high, and farmers generally turned their attention to producing, with the result of gutting the market and reducing the price to a non-paying one. Now, some of them have gone to the other extreme, and are slaughtering their sheep entire. After a time, if this mania for killing sheep continues, wool and sheep will bring high prices.

The same rule holds good with the farmers in any other business: "Buy when others are selling, and sell when others are buying."

MANAGEMENT OF POULTRY.—Poultry will prove a profitable branch of a small farm conveniently situated. Good poultry find a ready sale in our numerous large city markets, and on large farms they positively cost comparatively a small sum to raise and fatten. There are generally large quantities of grain scattered in the barnyards and lost unless eaten by fowls; there are myriads of insects, such as flies, bugs, worms, grasshoppers, etc., which numbers are diminished by the cock and his fowl owners; and even if kept up and fed, experience shows that for the amount of capital invested, the poultry contribute in proportion, as great a return as any part of the farm.

A stock of from twelve to twenty hens, with three cocks, are sufficient for a moderate sized family. If more are kept they will not do so well, as the cocks will disagree. If suffered to roost in the tops or branches of trees in winter or summer, and made to scratch for a living the best way they can, it could scarcely be expected they would prove thrifty and profitable. Vermin and inclement weather would blight expectations. Neither are all situations favorable to raising poultry. The main consideration however is, to provide comfortable quarters for every bird, and feed well. There is nothing lost by liberal feeding and comfortable protection from cold and storms.

THE BEST TIME TO SCRAPE AND CLEAN FRUIT TREES.—Many farmers form good resolutions during the winter for agricultural and horticultural operations, which they hope to reduce to practice as the seasons advance. They are anxious to get at it, and often undertake too much.

One of these resolutions is generally, and we speak from experience now, to scrape and clean off fruit trees early in order to head off insect deprivations; this has been, and is frequently done too early in the season. Some of our most experienced orchardists tell us that if done in March or April the bark of the trees will not regain their healthy, smooth appearance for two or three years thereafter. The operation above spoken of should be performed in the early part of June, when the tree is in full leaf, if the full benefit shall be derived therefrom.

POTATO CULTURE.—Small potatoes are generally the latest in maturing, and planting such for a succession will have a tendency to make the period of ripening later, so that a comparatively early variety may become late. Such is said to be the fact with the Peach Blow. To improve the early ripening quality of potatoes plant large tubers from the most Northern potato-growing region.
