AND AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PRO

FEEDING WHOLE GRAIN TO CATTLE. -It is an expensive system of management to feed whole grain to any kind of animals. All kinds of cereal grain are provided with a tough hull or skin, which the digestive powers of most animals will not dissolve; consequently, if the skin is not broken before the grain enters the stomach, the kernals will usually pass off with the droppings without offording the animals that swallowed the grain any more nourishment than fragments of weed of

cqual size. During the month of August last, the writer procured a quantity of herse manure for top-dressing strawberry plants, and in a few days after the mulch was spread around the plants the broken kernals of oats vegetated, so that the entire surface of the ground appeared as green as a lawn.

This fact showed conclusively that much of the grain had never afforded, the animals hat swallowed it any nourishment at all. Young horses having sound and sharp treth will sometimes crush every kernal. But old horses with poor teeth will frequently swallow half their mess of onts without

breaking the skin of the kernals. When mills are at a distance and people will pereist in feeding whole grain, it will always be found advantageous to soak the grain at least twenty four Lours Lefore

feeding it. Suppose, for example, a teamster is accustomed to feed a team eight quarts of Inthree times a day. Let the grain be put in a pail and covered with warm water every time the team is fed. This plan would require three pails when a team is fed three times daily. Warm water, is far better than cold water, as cold water, in cold weather, will soften the grain but little. Teamsters may rest assured that it will pay well for all trouble to soak grain before feeding it.

POTATOES-SEED REQUIRED FOR AN ACRE .- The general rule laid down by farmers is to allow ten bushels to an acre. This is very indefinite. The amount of seed required for an acre depends on the HOUSEKEEPING GOODS mode of planting (wheather in bills or drills, with cut or whole potatoes,) the kind of seed used, and the nature of the

Every man of my acquaintance who attempted, this year to plant an acre with cut seed in drills, using ten bushels, fell short from one-third to one-half. If you plant in hills, three feet apart each way, One medium sized potato in each hill, according to Mr. Harrison's plan, would require about 20 bushels. The averaged number of medium-sized potatoes in a bushel being about 240. If you plant in rows, three feet apart, and place your sets twelve inches apart in the rows, you require 14,520 sets. By measuring a peck or a bushel of the average size of your potatoes, and counting them, you can soon calculate the number of bushels you re-

Unless each hill yields as much as three stalks in a row, it would be less profitable to cultivate in hitls than by drill.

Just weigh two or five pound of seed for each method, and make the experiment next season, for yourself. Acurate experiment is required, in order to successful farming.

ROLLING GRAIN IN THE SPRING .- If farmers would look at the theory of rolling the wheat and rye fields in the spring, says the Germantown Telegraph, it would be resorted to much more frequently than it is. Occasionally the winter and spring have been so tavorable to these crops as not to render it necessary. But in three seasons out of four it is necessary, and doubtless adds considerable to their productiveness. The thawings and the freezings of the ground, throwing or spewing out the roots and exposing them to the dry ing winds of February and March, very seriously affect the grain. Passing a roller over as soon as the soil is fit to cuter Brown Sugars. up in, presses back the roots into their beds, and gives them a fair grip again upon the support on which the crop must depend. This must be apparent to every one who will look at its operation. We have no doubt that rolling clover fields that have been badly thrown up by the frost, would also have a most beneficial effect.

A writer in the Hearth and Home save that according to the best analyses and practical experiments, 400 pounds of beets are equivalent to 100 pounds of the best English hay, at \$25 per ton.

A Maine farmer fattened a cow chiefly on turnips, and the result surpassed expectation. The beef was of fine quality, and the tallow unusually abundant.
