GRASS FOR HORSES.—Many persons think that horses that are kept in the stable all summer should not be allowed to eat grass. They think it will make the horse soft, wishy-washy, and that it will throw him out of condition for hard work. This is particularly the case with some of the trainers of trotting and running horses. And horses that are kept up for farm and other work are refused grass because their drivers think they will not eat hay so well. This was formerly the case more than it is now, but these are all erroneous opinions and practices, and are giving way, gradually if to a more reasonable and natural system of feeding. Grass is the natural food for the horse. It is cooling and healthful food. It keeps the bowels open and sharpens the appetite. It promotes digestion, and removes fever from the system. Therefore, by all means, let the horse nip grass fifteen or twenty minutes daily. Whether training for trotting or running, it will be attended with the highest benefit. The horse will lose none of his speed by such a course of treatment. Horses that are kept up the year round for farm work should certainly be allowed a nibble at grass every day. They work hard, and all they get for it is something to eat. Let them have, then, what they all like so well—Rural World.

STOP THE LEAK.—Turn the drain, the one that runs out of your barn yard into the gutter by the highway. It doesn't make much difference which way you turn it, so that it discharges its contents on some part of the farm. Such a leak as this is far more expensive than one in our vinegar, cider or syrup barrel. Turn the one from the sink spout. A good spot to lead to is in the location of some grape vine or apple tree. The roots of the former will take up everything that is soluble in it, and will give you clusters of grapes instead, while the leaves will dispose of most of the volatile and offensive gases that will arise. We know an old farmer East who said he made his sink spout pay his taxes every year. He had an enormous russet apple tree planted within a few yards of the kitchen. On its roots, the dish water flowed as often as the family partook of their meals. We generally forget to feed our trees and vines, and too often lose our expected supply of fruit. But by an arrangement of this kind we make provisions for a constant supply of nutriment.—Prairie Farmer.

WHITE WASH.—The readers of the Alleghanian who are engaged in house cleaning will find the following an excellent recipe for white wash. It will be remarkable for its clear white color, and the walls will not look streaked when finished. Recipe—Slake a half peck of white lime, letting it stand from twelve to forty-eight hours, or more, if convenient. To this add three pounds of whitening. Afterwards stir in about three quarts of four paste, adding a half pound of sulphate of copper dissolved in a quart of water. Thin water, if required. This will look quite blue in the vessel before it is applied, but makes a clear and beautiful white when dry upon the walls.

At the Iowa Agricultural Convention recently held, the question of horse racing at fairs met with an overwhelming defeat. Only a single person raised his voice in its favor. The county societies in that State and in Ohio are generally taking measures to abolish this singular branch of an agricultural exhibition.

FOOD FOR CHICKENS.—A writer recommends for chickens, for the first week after hatching, hard-boiled eggs, to be given, chopped fine, at least twice a day, wheat steeped in milk, and coarse Indian meal, bread crumbs, etc. A change of food is necessary twice a week, substituting cracked corn for wheat.

At Monterey, in the southern part of California, on the 30th of January, the fruit on a pear tree had already attained the size of pigeon's eggs. Apple and peach trees had been in bloom for some time, and in a few instances had put out leaves.
