LOCAL CORRESPONDENCE. LETTER FROM WILMORE.—THE GREAT HOMICIDE CASE.—MURDER OF MR. GEORGE SETTLEMAYER.—ARREST OF FOUR SUPPOSED PARTICIPANTS IN THE HOMICIDE—WHO THEY ARE, WHAT THEY ARE, AND ALL ABOUT THEM—FULL PARTICULARS OF THE MELANCHOLY AFFAIR, &c., &c.

WILMORE, June 21, 1869. To the Editors of The Alleghenian: My first duty as a correspondent is a very melancholy one, and one that I can hardly command myself to relate. A flagrant outrage has been committed upon the peace of our community; a violent murder has been committed in our midst; a family circle has been broken up by the head thereof being stricken down upon the threshold of his own peaceful domicile, and under circumstances so inhuman and brutal that there remain no palliating circumstances for the perpetrators of the deed.

There will be a big fight in Convention, all which will be seen and duly reported by OBSERVER.

Dr. A. Chestnutwood and Dr. Kreiss held a post mortem examination of the body on the 17th. It was conducted with great professional skill. The verdict was as hereinbefore stated.

Our District Attorney, Mr. Tierney, used every effort in his power to bring the criminals to justice. He stayed here for a considerably length of time, and lent all his energies to the disagreeable task of hunting down those charged with the commission of a terrible crime.

JOHNSTOWN.—The Johnstown Tribune gives the following: "More than a year and a half ago a daughter of Gale Heslop of Johnstown, aged nearly ten years, while sitting at her desk in school with a shawl pin in her mouth, was playfully struck on the back by a schoolmate. The action caused the pin to slip into her throat, and she exclaimed that she had swallowed it. The pin was an ordinary metallic pin, with a round black head as large as a pea—the whole measuring an inch and a quarter in length. The child experienced no serious inconvenience, but in a short time an annoying cough commenced to afflict her daily and almost hourly. She became somewhat thinner in flesh, but could eat and play like other children. Occasionally she had slight hemorrhages. Last week she coughed up the pin! Evidently it had lodged in some of the passages near the upper part of the chest."
