The Nominations.

The State Convention did its work quickly and well. It set the party an example of zeal and harmony. It gave us good nominces and a good platform. For these things, it deserves the thanks of all. The re-nomination of Gen. John W. Geary expresses the utmost unanimous wish of the Republican masses of Pennsylvania. They-desired as their nomince a gallant Union soldier, and their first ch ice among the many gallant soldiers of Pennsylvania was J. hn W. Geary. The unanimity of the Convention and the enthusia in of the people mark plainly the duty of that small band which has bitterly opposed his nomination. That duty is expressed in one word-acquinenergo. In common with many others, we have at times been constrained to differ with Governor Geary as to the wisdom of his actions. Yet as to the purity of his administration, his faithfulness to the public interests, and his desire honestly to serve and fairly to represent the people, we have not now, neither have we had, a shadow of doubt. His administration has been a succes, and will bear favorable comparison with any that has preceded it. Any opposition, secret or open, active or passive, to his reefection, based on the fact that in his priwate views he is eitcher in favor of total abstinence and prohibition, or opposed to them, is foolish and suicidal. The line of distinction between the private judgment and the official duty of a public officer is as marked as the difference between morning and midday. If the people of the State desire the passage of any particular law, nothing will justify a Governor in resisting their legitimately expressed will except the fact that they ask what is plainly at war with the provisions of the Constitution, or clearly against public policy. Nor is the Constitution of his own private interpretation, but must be construed according to well known rules. An officer designated by law is to use his best efforts to assist the Governor in attaining a corthe people is thus legitimately expressed, the Governor of the State would be faithless to his trust did he not obey it. As long as it is not so expressed, the private views of the Governor are of no more account before the law than the private views of his bootblack. In the person of Hon. H. W. Williams for the position of Supreme Ju 'ge, the Convention honored the candidate and the candidate honors the State. Judge Williams for many years presided over the inst. District Court of Allegheny county, and By his faithful discharge of the responsible duties of his position so won the good will and admiration of men of all shades of politics within his jurisdiction that they unanimously re-assigned him to his position. Two years ago, the Williamsport Republican convention made him our candidate for the position for which he now runs, but he was defeated by Judge Sharswood by less than one thousand votes .---Soon after, he was offered and accepted the position on the Supreme bench made vacant by Judge Strong, and since that time has adorned our highest judicial tribunal by industry, learning, uprightness, and all other qualities that make a thoroughly competent judge. As to the importance of the campaign now approaching, it ought not to be necessary to say a single word. The lower branch of the Legislature is to be elected for one year. A Governor is to be elecsed for two years. The action of the Legislature in ratifying the 15th amendment is to be approved or disapproved. Last, but not least, a verdict is to be made up as to the fitness, faithfulness, and worthiness of the Republican party to control the affairs of the State. First, then, it is the duty of the Legislature to protect persons in the enjoyment of all their natural rights, as personal liberty and personal security. It is also the duty of the Legislature to regulate such rights and duties as grow out of the compact of society, by protecting persons in the enjoyment of the payment of taxes of unseated lands. first and by enforcing the second. Hence, it frowns upon and punishes whatever is scandalous to religion or good morals, or that plainly tends te bring them into disrespect. But only for this limited purpose does it assume to define either religion or morals. Maliciously and publicly to revile the Christian religion is an indictable act. Yet to oppose it, to denounce it as false, if done in good faith and in decency, is no violation of the law. But when the law says what a man shall or shall not drink, it steps beyond its sphere and assumes to regulate private conscience and conduct. It may regulate the public selling of liquors, or even prohibit them from being publicly sold as a beverage, on the ground that their sale tends to produce idleness, carousing, and disorderly conduct. But certainly, if I have laid down the rule broidery and ornamental work. correctly, it cannot go further. There is one other consideration that I might as well add here. The law acts by force. 
