CENTENNIAL.

We are in receipt of a series of circu-
lars from Mr. BURNET LANDRETH, Chief of
the Bureau of Agriculture of the Cen-
tennial Commission, giving valuable in-
formation regarding the arrangements
which are being made for a proper repre-
sentation of the Agricultural interests of
the country at the great exhibition. We
give below the general circular:

The Centennial Commission realizing the
importance of the Agricultural interests of
the United States, and anticipating the de-
mands that will be made for a proper repre-
sentation in the International Exhibition of
1876, is making ample provision for the ac-
commodation of this department.

It has been organized as one of the Bu-
reaus of Administration of the Exhibition,
and will comprehend the native and culti-
vated Products of the Soil, and of objects
more directly derived therefrom, Agricultural
Machinery and Farm Appliances.

The Building, most eligibly located in
Fairmount Park, will cover nearly ten acres.
There will be provided, also, ample and suit-
able accommodations for the shelter and dis-
play of Live Stock, which it is intended
shall be exhibited during the months of Sep-
tember and October.

The Exhibition will open on the 10th of
May, 1876, and it is therefore necessary that
those who desire to exhibit cereals, forage-
plants and tubers should make their prepara-
tions during the present season.

This exhibition being International, will
bring together for comparison the best pro-
ducts from every quarter of the Globe;
hence every effort should be made to give
just evidence of the capacity of the varied
climates, soils, skill in tillage, and the char-
acter of the live stock of the United States;
whilst the Mechanical aids to Agriculture
should exhibit ingenuity, excellence of work-
manship, and adaptation to desired ends.
The classification will more fully make man-
ifest the arrangement and comprehensiveness
of this department. Applications for
space should be made as early as practicable,
on the forms which will be furnished by the
Chief of this Bureau.

The prompt co-operation of State, County
and other Agricultural organizations, as well
as of all individuals interested in the prac-
tice of Rural Science, Stock-breeding, and
Forestry, is earnestly solicited.
