A correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial says that General Garfield, at the head of a United States force, advanced lately from Picketon to Pound Gap...

General Jackson, with the confederate army under his command, is now reported to be at Mount Jackson, about thirty miles south of Strasburg...

It is reported that General Jeff. Thompson is at the head of a confederate force, marching on Cape Girardeau, a town on the Mississippi, forty-five miles above Cairo...

Two companies of United States troops were landed near Mississippi City from Ship Island some weeks since, and were attacked by a strong force of confederates...

The official report of our loss at the battle of Pen Ridge states the number of killed at two hundred and seventy-two, the wounded at nine hundred and thirty-six...

General Halleck has assigned General Baell to the command of that portion of the Ohio included in the present department of the Mississippi and General Denver to the command of the District of Kansas...

A dispatch from Nashville says that, according to southern advices received there, Mr. Vanoy has arrived at New Orleans, where he made a speech declaring that he had not been expected from England or France...

WASHINGTON, March 20.—"What have I done that mine enemy should praise me?" was the question of one whom we had every reason to doubt and despise...

There is really no possible hopeful end to this conflict, but the end of slavery. There is no such easy escape from our national troubles as some seem to imagine...

I have not thought it necessary to show that, under existing circumstances, we are released from all legal or moral obligation to longer tolerate slavery in the land...

The permission of slavery in the constitution, if such there be, is asserted and generally admitted to be implied, and nowhere expressly declared...

The framers must have intended that when slavery should be done away the constitution should still remain; and that with this national progress, and extermination of evil, the language of the constitution should become even now more appropriate...
