They are the more gratified in view of the fact that the action both of the Legislature and of the Governor was taken after careful and searching inquiry, and they pledge themselves to spare no pains to justify the good will and confidence thus expressed.

*Resolved*, That a copy of the above resolution be sent to His Excellency, the Governor, and to each member of the Legislature.

*Resolved*, That the faculty and students of the Pennsylvania State College, and the citizens of the community, hereby tender President Atherton a hearty acknowledgement of his untiring efforts, his unbounded enthusiasm and his careful administration which have secured to P. S. C. this new promise of growth and prosperity.
