*THE STATE COLLEGE AWARDED  
THE CHAMPIONSHIP.*

The state association of college football teams met at Harrisburg, January 9th, and awarded the pennant to the State College. The meeting was held at the Lochiel hotel, and the colleges were represented as follows: J. M. Wolfe, C. E. Folmer, C. W. Allen, Bucknell; F. N. Carr, Swarthmore; B. Griffith, A. B. Bauman, Franklin and Marshall; A. C. McCrea, Dickinson; J. P. Palen, Haverford; R. W. Williamson, C. H. Hile, J. F. Shields, State College. In the absence of President Irvine, William Griffith, of Franklin and Marshall, presided.

After hearing the treasurer's report, which showed the finances to be in an excellent condition, the secretary was called upon to report the club standing, which he did in tabulated form.

The Franklin and Marshall versus Dickinson game which was to have been played on November 18th was decided a draw.

The Dickinson versus State College game, of November 29th, which was to have been played at Altoona, was declared forfeited to State College, Dickinson not having put in an appearance. This decision also carried with it the expulsion of Dickinson from the association. Dickinson claimed that the State College had agreed to pay expenses at Altoona and then went back on the agreement, but it was shown that this defense on Dickinson's part had not been made within the legal time previous to the day set for the game, and that Dickinson evidently had no intention of playing, as it neglected to answer the correspondence relating to referees and other matters.

There was no election of officers, the rules stipulating that the Athletic associations of the first four winning colleges shall choose the officers. Under this rule the State College is entitled to the pres-

idency, Bucknell to the vice presidency, Swarthmore to the secretary, and Franklin and Marshall to the treasurer,

A committee consisting of Messrs. Wolfe, Bauman, Carr, Shields and Collins was appointed to revise the constitution, and the sum of \$50 was voted to purchase a pennant for the champion team. According to the decision of to-day's meeting the standing of the clubs is as follows:
