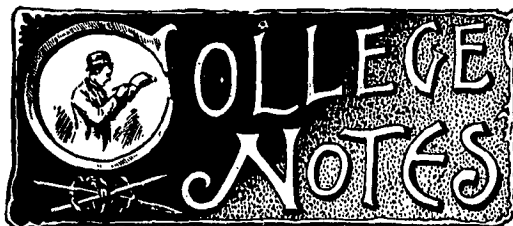

- (a) P x P or P—Q 4 would be better. If P—Q 4 were followed by black takes kings pawn, he would then move to K 5 leaving white a very fine position notwithstanding the loss of a pawn.
- (b) This move is worse than wasted since it opens black's game in precisely the manner he wishes and white probably will be compelled to lose the kings pawn. Bishop retreats to Q 3 would be better by far, should black then force the exchange of the bishop queen's and queen's bishop's pawns, the loss of the game will likely follow.
- (c) A very ineffectual move.
- (d) Good, and followed by very "friendly" play upon the part of white.
- (e) Black cannot castle, but still this is a very poor move of which white takes advantage. Certainly black should have brought off this bishop.
- (f) Probably the most telling move on the board.
- (g) An error that should have cost black the game.
- (h) Whites last five moves would have lead one to expect better things. Q x Q Kt P ought to win.
