

Emperor William of Germany has presented a trophy valued at 5,000 marks to be competed for by the crews of the different German universities.

Princeton has made a long stride in the direction of the elective system in college studies. The Freshmen and Sophomores are given a limited range, but the Juniors and Seniors are entirely free to select their own courses.

The Board of Regents of the State University of Michigan has resolved "that henceforth, in the selection of professors, instructors, and other assistants for the University, no distinction be made between men and women, but the applicant best fitted receive the appointment.—*Ariel.*

The University of Michigan is to try a new plan for devotional exercises. Instead of the daily chapel exercises, which had to be discontinued on account of the change in recitation hours, there will be vesper services twice a week at 4 o'clock for the whole university. The great World's Fair organ, which the university has secured, will be used at these services.

One hour of debating each week is a required course for Amherst Seniors. The question for the debate between Cornell and the University of Pennsylvania which will be held on March 8, is *Resolved*, "That the most effective means of restricting the liquor traffic is to eliminate the element of private profit." Many colleges are awakening to the fact that to talk and to "think on one's feet" form an important part of a college education. The more our colleges realize this the better.
