

ing facts pertaining to the FREE LANCE in 1898:—The volume consisted of 347 pages of reading matter, containing 150,000 words, the equivalent of 300 Freshman essays. In all, 4935 copies were printed. If all of the sheets of paper used in printing these copies would be placed end to end, they would make a strip 18 miles long. The LANCE circulated in 22 states and territories.
