—Among a number changes to be found in the catalogue for 1902-1903, those in the Mines and Mining Engineering Course and in the Electrical Engineering Course are especially to be noticed.

The Mining Course has been expanded, revised and bettered so that it is really a new course. The Freshman year is changed but slightly, but in the Sophomore year there are alterations which tend to make the course more distinctly one of mining. For example, geology, formerly given to Juniors, is now required in the Sophomore year. The work required in the Junior and Senior years has also been greatly advanced. The elective work has been enlarged until it embraces almost all subjects taught here.

What has been said of the Mining Course is relatively true of the Electrical Course. This has been so re-arranged as to allow a student to follow any of four different branches of electrical engineering. These are: First, the general electrical
