A goose egg was saved for the Tigers in the seventh inning by Purnell's hit, and his scoring on another by Wells and an error by Mason. Second base had not been touched by any player until the fourth inning, when State scored five runs. During the eighth the Tigers had the bases filled, and their spirits seemed to brighten, but only to return to the former state without scoring. The victory was largely due to McIlveen's splendid pitching, but every man was on the alert, giving him the suport which enlivened the whole team in spite of the cold and snow. Toward the end of the game, Dewitt, of Princeton fame, appeared with a few half-hearted, half-frozen rooters to cheer up their team, but it seemed to do as much for State's nine, and they played steadier than before, closing the game by catching the last two men at home plate.
