University of Pennsylvania has signed a two-year contract in football with Michigan University.

The seniors at Colgate have decided not to wear sweaters, flannel shirts, high shoes, or corduroys during the spring term.

Statistics give the average salary of graduates of Boston Tech. at \$623 the first year, \$3,000 after ten years, and \$5,000 after twenty years.

Harvard University has decided to play football according to the new rules. However, she has cut University of Pennsylvania off her schedule.

Amherst College has adopted the honor system. Freshmen caught cheating are suspended for a term, those from the three upper classes will be expelled.

Ohio Wesleyan has taken steps toward the adoption of the Honor

System. It will be tried in various forms in different class rooms before a general system is given to the whole college.

The Athletic Association of Dickinson college has decided that, hereafter, managers of athletic teams shall not be permitted to wear the letter "D," except on a small button in the lapel of the coat.

The Mask and Wig Club of Penn has given \$500 to the University. This will be known as the Mask and Wig Fund, and will be used for whatever purpose the members of the club and the trustees of the University decide upon.—Ex.

A national conference of Greek letter fraternities will be held next fall at the University of Illinois. The conference has been called by President James for the purpose of discussing the questions of mutual interest.

A new national organization, known as the Delta Sigma Rho, was recently formed in Chicago. Membership is limited to orators and debaters, and, moreover, they must have represented their Alma Mater in some inter-collegiate contest.

Lafayette has just changed her entrance requirements to make it possible for a larger number of men to enter the Pardee Scientific department. Two years of French will be equivalent to two of German, and one year of Chemistry to one of Physics.

At Princeton the trustees have adopted a new system of chapel attendance. Formerly each student was assigned a seat in chapel. Now each student receives a blank slip on entering, which he signs and leaves at the door as he goes out.—The Campus.

President Smith of Ohio Northern University refused class registration to two students because they were fraternity men. At the opening of the spring term all prospective

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
