It was undoubtedly one of the most remarkable battles ever fought on any college diamond, each nine securing but a single hit.

Princeton's only chance to score came in the seventh, when, after Mc-Lean had died from McIlveen to Ross. Bard hit a high one to left which Pearce was unable to get, the big first-baseman reaching third safely. With the famous Cooney at bat, the Princeton stands were in an uproar, but all he could do was to bound a hot one at McIlveen who caught it in one hand, and tossed it to Kilmer, as Bard came running home. Bard started back to third, "Dutch" sent the ball to Mason who retired the runner, and shot the sphere to second, almost catching Cooney also. Byram batted for Heyninger and drew a base on balls, but Reid retired the side by sending a hot line drive over third, which was taken in by Mason.

The magnificent pitching of our star, McIlveen, was largely responsible for this glorious victory, although the fast fielding of every State man helped wonderfully. In the field, State's work was far superior to that of Princeton, as all State's errors came on difficult chances, while for Princeton Cooney's poor throwing gave State a chance for victory.
