The names and records of the successful men follow :---

J. J. Kaiser '06, half-mile run in 2 minutes 1 3-5 seconds at Annapolis, May 12th, 1906; V. L. Henry '07, 100 yard dash in 10 seconds at Carlisle, Pa., May 5th, 1906; W. T. Dunn '08, 16 lb. hammer throw,128 ft. 10 inches at State College, June 13, 1906; G. L. Strayer '09, polevault 11 feet 1 1-2 inches at State College, June 13, 1906.
