It appears, according to an act of Congress passed on June 22, 1906, that the Secretary of the Interior is authorized to dispose of a part or of all the model exhibit of the Patent Office, either by sale, gift, or otherwise. Acting Commissioner E. C. Moore has issued a notice to the effect that immediate requests from polytechnic schools and colleges having technical courses for portions of the exhibit will be considered in the disposition of the models.


A New Instructor.
