The New Agricultural Building.

It seems quite probable that the present Legislature will appropriate the necessary funds for the completion of the new Agricultural building. As soon as the money is available, steps will be taken to rush the remainder of the work, and if possible, the building will be put in use next fall. This stately structure, of Italian style, will be, when completed, one of the best equipped buildings in the country devoted to instruction in agriculture.

The basement of the north wing will contain a combustion laboratory and a room for the study of animal nutrition. On the floor above there is to be a large assembly hall, and over that a room for agricultural chemistry. The central part of the building, from the basement up, will be divided into offices, libraries, and lecture rooms. The south wing will furnish room for stock judging and agricultural engineering in the basement, agronomy, lecture rooms, and a museum on the first floor, and correspondence work on the second. The Dairy building in the rear will be connected with and made a part of the main structure. With these excellent facilities, State will be able to carry on this phase of its work with a thoroughness not excelled by any similar institution.
