
Thomas C. LeFevre, '04, was married last week to Miss May Love, of East Brandywine, Pa. The Collegian extends congratulations.

The Senior Thesis Trip.

Two weeks ago a party of 18 seniors and 4 juniors from the Mechanical and Electrical departments, under the charge of Prof. Wood, went to Harrisburg to make some tests on the power plant of the State capitol building. The work began with a complete test of the boilers, and was followed by a twenty hour test of the engines, necessitating the burning of the lights during that time. Another twenty hour test was made on the electrical machinery.

These tests are to be the thesis work for all the students who made the trip. The idea of the three tests was the suggestion of Superintendent Rambo of the capitol, in order to find out the exact capacity of the boilers, engines, and electrical apparatus, and how they can be run most economically. The mechanical seniors are back in college, but the electricals have joined their class on the inspection trip.



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
