On Friday evening, the 13th, at eight o'clock the first intercollegiate debate of the year will take place in the Auditorium. The question for debate is, Resolved, that the initiative and referendum systems of enacting legislation should be adopted by Pennsylvania. Dickinson has the affirmative of the proposition. The speakers, in order named, are G. H. Ketterer, W. H. Davenport, and L. H. Chrisman, with John Shilling as alternate.

Farmers' Week.

The farmers' meeting at the college, known as Farmers' Week, which proved so successful last year, will be held again this year, January 1-9, inclusive. Last year's meeting proved unusually successful, there being no fewer than 188 visitors registered, coming from 36 counties. The enlargement and broadening of the school of Agriculture and the addition of new instructors will help to make this year's gathering even more profitable than that of last year. Among the subjects to be discussed are fertilizers, soils, seed selection, stock judging, breeding and reeding, poultry, the horse, creamery and dairy work forestry, orchard management, gardening, and home economics.

The work will be thoroughly practical in every detail. Part of the time will be spent in lectures and discussion, while the remainder will be devoted to practical demonstrations.

A detailed program will be ready early in December. All who are interested in the work are urged to see or correspond with Prof. H. E. Van Norman.
