A few days ago he came home for the holidays, and at noon on Thursday he went to the Engineering building to see some friends. While he was in the building death came suddenly, being due to paralysis of the brain.

Mr. Buckhout was a man highly respected and popular among his associates. He is survived by his parents, two brothers, and two sisters.
