BASKETBALL SEASON CLOSES.

A Victory Over Delaware College Ends a Well Played Schedule.

State men may well feel proud of their basketball representation for the season of 1908. A team that has developed as the present one has without a coach is to be congratulated most highly and the skill they have attained in swift and accurate passing, as well as the teamwork displayed, is absolutely the best ever shown by a Penn State team. The individual playing has shown that we have a collec-

tion of stars and, although we lose Captain DuBarry next year, such men as Waha, Funston, Hermann, Reed and Ross will form the nucleus of a team of which great results can be expected. Manager Harding also deserves great credit for his services, as well as "Casey" Fox, "Turk" Dilion and the other members of the squad, for the interest taken in helping to develop a winning team.

TRACK PROSPECTS.
