The college has just issued a four page circular on the twelve-weeks' course in home economics and dairying, which begins Jan. 7.

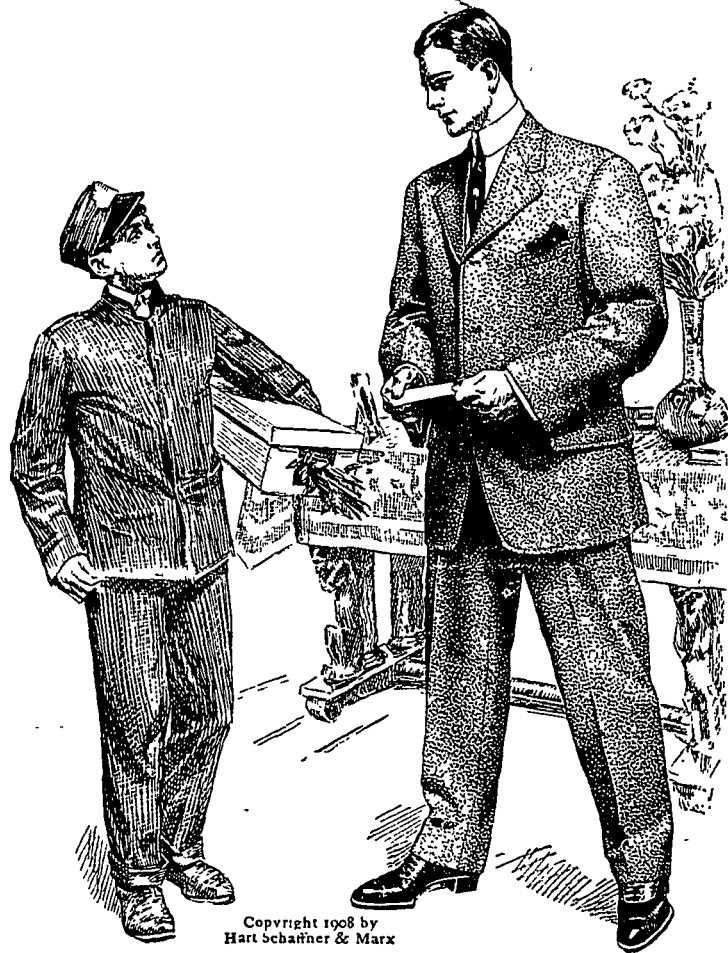
J. C. Gotwals, '06, visited the college last week. He has been engaged for some time in work for the state highway department of New York.
