certain individual right to the senior class of exemption for the entire year, and, at the same time, will give the junior class the same right as it approaches the rank of senior."

The Regimental Review.

The annual Pennsylvania Day review of the cadet regiment proved eminently satisfactory to everyone connected with the military department. The reviewing officer was Major General John A. Wiley, of Franklin, Pa., who is at the head of the national guard of Pennsylvania. He was assisted by Col. Jefferies and Col. Taylor, who is in command of the Fifth Regiment. With Col. Taylor were the members of his staff, Captains Locke, Robison, Hayes, and Hunter.
