Mr. John T. Bealor, of Pittsburg, lectured on "Systems of Heating and Ventilating," before the combined engineering societies on Monday afternoon.

In closing he stated that there was a great dearth of suitably trained heating and ventilating engineers and that as a result, much improper work has been and is being installed to the serious injury of the health and comfort of our nation. Later, in conversation, he complimented the college on the excellence, in general, of the system here and the economy of its operation.
