## The New Athletic Field.

There is perhaps nothing being watched with so much interest by the students and alumni, as the new athletic field, which is almost completed. The fifteen thousand dollars which were appropriated by the state is well nigh spent and soon we shall have one of the greatest fields in the country.

The track, according to the best authority, will be the fastest in the country. It is a quarter mile oval with a two hundred and twenty yard straightaway. The bed consists of a four inch layer of heavy stone, four inches of two-and-a-half stone thoroughly rolled, two inches of three-quarter inch stone, all covered with six inches of engine sparks. The last mentioned material was kindly donated by the Pennsylvania Railroad and is the finest that can be obtained.

It is expected that a permanent swimming pool and bath house will be ready for use by Commencement. This building will be made of concrete and will contain eighteen bathrooms and five showers. The ground for an athletic cage may be broken about Commencement time.

The new field will consist of the varsity field proper, in which base-ball, track, football and lacrosse will
