From this list the class shall select five candidates for each of the positions to be filled from that class The Faculty Com mittee on Scholarships shall then choose one of these candidates from each five presented, basing the selection on scholarship, and taking into consideration qualities of character and general attitude toward the college. These nominations shall then be presented to the president of the college for approval or disapproval; and when the nominations are finally approved, they shall be ratified or rejected by the faculty.

This contest was open only to senior girls in the colleges of Pennsylvania. Miss Glenn 106 won the same prize three years ago.
