COLLEGE NOTES.

The Hon. W. H. Patterson, of Clearfield, a trustee of the college, has secured the donation of 16,000 vitrified brick for the improvement of the entrance to the campus. A public subscription of \$375 will also be used in making the approach to the college a model entrance. It is planned to pave the crossing of College avenue and Allen street, and also to pave all the crossings on the campus. This, however, will not be done until after Commencement.

Prof. C. W. Larsen, instructor in dairy husbandry at the Pennsylvania State College, has been granted leave of absence to represent the dairy division, U. S. department of agriculture, as government inspector of butter for the navy contract at Lake Mills (Iowa) creamery.

Other improvements to be made during the summer will be the placing underground of all the wires which lead to and from the engineering annex.
